Description of Course

To assist graduate students in planning and executing a research project, preparing a thesis or dissertation, and reporting research results in journal publications. Specifically, the course will guide students in the selection and statement of a graduate research project and the development of a research proposal, introduce proper research methods such as record keeping and intellectual property considerations, discuss ethical research methods and review written and oral methods for presentation of research

Course Format

The course format will include lectures, class discussions, and student presentations over Zoom.

Course Objectives

Students will learn the basics of scientific inference, how to write and review scientific papers and proposals, and research ethics.

These objectives will be accomplished through:

- 1. Participating in discussions in class.
- 2. Writing a research proposal and revising it based on peer reviews.
- 3. Reviewing a scientific paper.
- 4. Discussion of major issues facing early-career scientists and ethical issues in research.

Expected Learning Outcomes

Upon completing this course students will:

1. Write a draft of their thesis/dissertation proposal

- 2. Be able to describe the NSF Review Criteria.
- 3. Be able to perform a literature search and use reference management software to format citations.
- 4. Be able to describe the peer review process for scientific manuscripts.
- 5. Be able to describe what constitutes ethical scientific research.
